

It is celebrated on September 8, and this year's theme was Share stories, give joy. Students from all different academic levels can participate, including university students from public and private institutions.

This year, they read many diverse books, mostly from Puerto Rican authors of different genres such as lyrical poetry, dramatic theatre, short stories, novels, and essays. Some of the authors that were read include Luz Bonilla, Tere Marichal, Lara Mercado, Armando Valdés, and María de los Ángeles, among others. The following books were read during this activity: iPeligro, nuestras especies se extinguen!, Cuentos Folklóricos de P.R., Un cubito en el lineal, Generosa la gallinita agricultora, Las manchas de Daniela, Un coquí de Borinquen canta aquí y allá también, La fiesta de las abejitas, Así es la vida, among others.

This event was organized by teacher Mildred Noriega, along with other teachers from the Spanish Department. With the Maratón de Lectura, students are expected to continue developing their love for reading and to understand the power it has in their lives. They will be able to recognize the importance of reading as a tool for learning, imagining, enjoying, and expanding their knowledge and values.




## **School Field Trip**

Did you know?



... that as of September 15th, it's officially Hispanic Heritage Month!

Hispanic Heritage Month originated as Hispanic Heritage Week in 1968, introduced by Congressman George E. Brown. Brown wanted to highlight the efforts and accomplishments of the Latino and Hispanic communities throughout American history. Later in 1989, it was officially declared that Hispanic Heritage Week would be changed to Hispanic Heritage Month.

But have you ever wondered why it specifically starts on the 15th of September? The reason is interesting: on that same day in 1821, five separate nations declared their independence These nations from Spain. Nicaragua, Honduras, Guatemala, El Salvador, and Costa Rica. But it's not just that, on September 16th, 1810, Mexico declared independence from Spain, then two days later, Chile also proclaimed its sovereignty. Finally, on September 21st, 1981, Belize declared independence from Great Britain. So, as you can see, the month of September holds a lot of significance in Hispanic history and culture, and it was chosen for a very specific reason.

This Hispanic Heritage Month, we encourage you to strive for excellence in every aspect of life and never stop pursuing your goals. So that one day you can become an inspiration to other kids who were just like you.



# **Volleyball Tournament**


