Did you know that Rosa Parks' famous bus protest took place on December 1, 1955, changing the course of civil rights history? Without her knowing, this simple act became one of the greatest movements in history. Mrs. Parks was not the first person to be prosecuted for violating the segregation laws on the city buses in Montgomery; however, her character was held in high esteem by all those who knew her. At the time of her arrest, Mrs. Parks was serving as secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). Her arrest became a rallying point around which the African American community organized a bus boycott in protest of the discrimination they had endured for years. During this time was when Martin Luther King, Jr., the 26-year-old minister of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, first achieved national fame as the public became acquainted with his powerful oratory. Through this act, we can see how our actions hold power because, through a quiet act of defiance that resonated throughout the world, Rosa Parks is known and revered as the Mother of the Civil Rights Movement.
